FOREWORD

It has been two years since the COVID-19 pandemic upended the entire world.

The Philippine Constructors Association (PCA), which has served as a cornerstone for the country's growth and development, had big plans when we welcomed 2020 to mark our 75th year.

We opened the year with the unveiling of the Action Plans for the Philippine Construction Industry Roadmap 2020-2030, which was launched the year before at PHILCONSTRUCT Luzon.

But the outbreak of COVID-19 had a huge impact. From a growth of 9.7 percent in 2019, the Philippine construction industry headed to an unprecedented contraction of -25.7 percent in 2020, along with the rest of the economy.

With a transformative and forward-looking agenda in place, we were able to quickly reengineer our plans and programs to respond to the needs of the membership, industry, and nation.

Although the risks of COVID-19 increased as 2022 began, the strong 2021 economic performance, showed a clear path to recovery, albeit, the headwinds that still lie ahead.

Driven by a pick-up in consumer spending and construction in the second half of 2021, the economy grew by 7.7 percent in the fourth quarter, resulting in a 5.6 percent full-year growth – surpassing the government's revised high-end target of 5.5 percent.

From the revised 17.4 percent growth in the third quarter of 2021, the construction industry grew by 18.5 percent in the last quarter of the year, registering an annual growth of 9.8 percent, one of the largest contributors to the economic growth for 2021.

As the country recovers from the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, our role as Nation-Builders becomes more pronounced.

This report details how we *Responded, Recovered, Returned, Reimagined,* and *Reformed* in the last two years. It also sets out our refreshed mission, vision, and purpose, as we face a new world ahead.



MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

As PCA was to celebrate its annual Christmas Party in December 2019, Typhoon Tisoy (Kunmuri) brought heavy rains to the National Capital Region.

Looking back at this eventful day a few months after, I asked myself if this was an *onus* of things to come – a kind of storm that we have not yet experienced.

2020 does not only mark the start of the global COVID-19 pandemic, but also marked the start of my term as the 38th PCA President.

The Philippine construction industry was growing the fastest among all sectors, at an average of 10 percent in the past five years and accounting for 10 percent of the total Filipino workforce.

By the second half of March 2020, the construction industry had to make an abrupt stop, and reached for an inflection point with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.

It has been a very challenging two years for all of us.

But with the support of our Board of Trustees, our Council of Leaders, our Membership, and our Secretariat, we managed not just to survive, but we were able to emerge stronger as well.



Looking beyond the last two years – with the 10-year industry roadmap as our *north star* – we continue our journey into the future, through the bridge we have built.

As the sky also cleared up before our annual Christmas Party on 3 December 2019 – at which event I was inducted as PCA President – the storm will also pass. With our continued prayers and perseverance, we can look forward to a better year.

With our sights set to 2030, we need to get boosted to be the "Association of Preferred Constructors in Building Nations." This, as we also mark our 85th year as a Nation Builder.

Through the Years

Organized in 1945 to help the country recover after the Second World War, PCA is the oldest trade organization in the Philippines.

Our Founders



Since our founding, we have been at the forefront of the continued development of the Philippine construction industry – from the rebuilding of Manila, a new airport, the first toll road in Asia, major infrastructures like the Pantabangan and Magat Dams, modern metropolis, to TPLEX, among others.



Though apolitical in our stance, we are a true partner in nation-building with the government – serving as the voice of the industry, and its catalyst.


As an ally of the government, our forefathers worked for the passage of Republic Act 4566 to professionalize and license the Filipino contractors, to the establishment of the:

- Philippine Overseas Contractors Board (POCB)
- Construction Manpower Development Foundation (CMDF)
- Construction Industry Authority of the Philippines (CIAP) as the central industry authority

The incumbent PCA President also seats in the CIAP Board, along with Chairmen of its Implementing Boards, who were nominated by the association.

To shape the future of construction, we worked with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) and CIAP, in crafting the 10-year industry roadmap – that Trade and Industry Secretary Ramon M. Lopez described as "a milestone for the construction industry."

Dubbed as the "future of the construction industry", the industry roadmap aims to shape the future capacity, values, and institutional integrity of the industry for the next ten years.



Serving as a strategic framework for the future of the industry, it highlights what the industry envisions itself to become by 2030 – a global partner in building nations – through the attainment of four integrated pillars: institutions, productivity, sustainability, and globalization.

In his message at the launch of the roadmap in 2019, the association's then President Mariano S. Agoncillo said,







With a Modest Growth in Our Membership

Despite the challenges of the last two years, we managed a 7.4 percent growth in our membership.




The downside is on the collection of Membership Dues. As of the end of 2021, only about 62 percent of our members are updated on their dues.

Despite this, with prudent fiscal management, better resource utilization, and sound investments during the previous years, the association was not only able to deliver, but has remained financially sound.

However, we need to be able to improve our collection of dues.

Accounting 48 Percent of All Quadruple A Contractors




Of the 152 regular members of PCA, 13 percent have Quadruple A rating, accounting for 48 percent, and representing 53 percent of all Filipino companies in this category.

Majority of our regular members, or 67 percent, hold Triple A rating from the Philippine Contractors Accreditation Board (PCAB).

As We Continue to Upskill Our Workforce

Despite the initial challenges, the Philippine Constructors Academy was able to upskill 1,005, as we ended 2021, from 43 in 2019.



A much-awaited offering by PCA Foundation for 2020, the 3rd edition of our highly-acclaimed PCA Construction Program Management Masterclass, was unfortunately cancelled.



But before 2020 ended, PCA Foundation released the book entitled "Masterclass: Construction Program Management." As Immediate Past President Agoncillo remarked on the purpose of the book, "to reach a wider audience, as PCA continues building knowledge and future leaders for the industry."

Done in partnership with the Building Research Service of the University of the Philippines – Diliman, the book chronicled the lectures and lessons from the 2nd edition of the Masterclass in 2019.

PCA Past President and former DPWH Secretary Dr. Fiorello R. Estuar described the book as "an invaluable book of knowledge for local professional practitioners." While former DPWH Secretary Gregorio R. Vigilar refers to it as "a must-have and must-read, for those who are in the construction business or are planning to join."






Pushing the Needle Forward

Envisioned to be the industry's prime mover in having the "right pool of talent", and "right talent pipeline" – the Philippine Constructors Academy was institutionalized in 2021 to consolidate all Skills and Knowledge Development initiatives and programs of PCA, chapters, affiliates, into one, cohesive, and agile platform.

- Identification and development, including Curriculum and Competency Standards Development Setting, and Institutional Assessment Mechanism
- Recognizing and assuring the programs of PCA, chapters, and affiliates, including academe partners Industry-based skills and knowledge certifications – on its own, or cross-branding with partners
- Embed the programs in, and in partnership with the academe for sustainable development
- Drive for the establishment of localized industry-academe councils

All These Towards Future-Proofing the Industry



As we start 2022, we hope to sign the Memorandum of Agreement for the establishment of a National Industry Board for Construction with the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA). PCA will not only be the industry partner, but will be the lead in the board for an industry-led, demand-driven, and area-based skills development.

With the aim to reduce occurrence of skills mismatch between the outputs of the learning institutions and the requirements of the industry, this recognition of the association – who was conferred as the 2021 TESDA Kabalikat Award – "is a long time coming," as said by PCA First Vice President, Ronaldo R. Elepaño, Jr.

2020 Started on an Upbeat Note

Fueled by the government's massive infrastructure program, and complemented by a strong private sector participation, the industry – characterized as entering a period of strong growth – was not just Asia's Rising Star, but was Asia's Most Exciting Construction Market.



As the year started, together with DTI-CIAP and other industry stakeholders, the Roadmap's Action Plans were unveiled at the 4th Philippine Construction Congress on 8 January 2020.



On 23 January 2020, President Decena convened the first meeting of the association's Board of Trustees, and presented the 8-point action agenda for 2020 at the first General Membership Meeting.

With the subsequent events, this was our last face-to-face General Membership Meeting.







Hitting the Ground Running, Then Halt

In enabling the 8-point action agenda, particularly the expansion of talent and capacity building nationwide, we continue to collaborate with our chapters and other partners.



We graduated the third batch of Construction Supervisors Training Program for the National Capital Region at the DM Consunji Technical Training Center





In partnership with PCA Pampanga, we graduated the first batch of Pambansang Treyners ng Konstruksyon, for the province, on 8 February 2020



With the clamor from DCACI, we started the second batch of the Pambansang Treyners ng Konstruksyon for Davao on 15 February 2020



In partnership with DCACI and L.V. Ledesma Construction, Inc., the second batch of trained construction supervisors in Davao graduated on 15 February 2021 – that was attended by TESDA Director General Secretary Isidro S. Lapeña





On 14 March 2020, we were able to graduate the first batch of Pambansang Treyners ng Konstruksyon in Ormoc, Leyte, together with PCA Ormoc Chapter





As part of increasing collaborations with PCA Chapters and Affiliates, President Decena, together with Executive Director Paulino, went to Pangasinan on 24 February 2020, for a dialogue with the Pangasinan Constructors Association. This led to the reinvigoration of the chapter.

While visits to other chapters, other than Davao and Pangasinan, were in the timeline – this had to take a back seat, with the declaration of the Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ), that took effect initially for Luzon, on 17 March 2020.

The Series of Events that Followed



The eruption of the Taal Volcano on 12 January 2020 started a series of events that were about to unfold.

With donations and support coming from PCA member and chapters firms – such as the Women in Infrastructure Foundation, Inc., Davao Constructors Association Center, Inc., and WDA, Inc. – PCA, together with DTI-CIAP, organized a relief operation for the victims of Taal, particularly for the evacuees at the Redemptorist Center in Lipa City, Batangas.

With dust and ash from the Taal Volcano eruption reaching as far as the National Capital Region, we started using facemasks and filters. Little did we know that we will continue to use these face masks in the next two years and counting.

No one expected nor was fully prepared for the catastrophe that came.








Turning the Year, Into One Like No Other

With the rising cases of COVID-19 in Philippines and in the world – and even before the declaration of the ECQ – PCA started issuing advisories that were also translated to local dialects to create awareness on how to protect offices and worksites.



With ECQ in place, the industry and the rest of the economy had to make an abrupt stop.

The Industry Made a Sudden Stop



As was everyone, the Philippine construction industry was completely blindsided. There was no event in the magnitude of the COVID-19 pandemic that people had envisaged in planning – even on a VUCA (vulnerable, uncertain, complex, and ambiguous) scenario setting.

It was helpful that with the transformative agenda set in place by the association's past presidents – and the clear action programs laid out at the start of the year by President Decena – PCA was able to immediately respond and adapt.

Weeks before the ECQ took effect, the association laid out a business continuity plan. And as the lockdown took effect, the Secretariat, despite the many challenges – which also required constant adjustments – was able to provide the needed support to our Board of Trustees and Membership, especially as initiatives and programs were being developed and implemented.

Beyond the mandate to provide support and services to our members, the association was able to also extend the same to the rest of the industry stakeholders.

Recovering from the initial impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the association adopted the 5-horizon approach in dealing with the evolving crisis.

Indubitably, COVID-19 had put lives, communities, industries, economies – and the world as a whole – at a standstill.

Cognizant of the disruption ECQ caused to the workforce, the Philippine President called on big enterprises to consider advancing the 13th month pay, or paying them even just half of their salaries as a way of showing solidarity in this critical and challenging time.


In response to this call and in one of the first in a series of advisories PCA issued – we enjoined capable members of the association to extend assistance to their employees to weather the disruption caused by the ECQ.

As the ECQ went on its second week, and as other regions had started their own quarantine measures, PCA received requests from member and chapter firms for guidance and best practices that they can use as reference in dealing with the disruption.

To get a feel on the financial and other assistance being extended by member and chapter firms, we conducted an online survey that started on 28 March 2020. The results showed that most of our members, not only heeded the government's suggestion to provide assistance to their workers, but did more.

At this time, the Philippine construction industry was still not considered an essential sector. In which case, all public and private construction projects in Luzon were suspended.

SURVEY AT A GLANCE



The preliminary analysis conducted on the impact of the ECQ in Luzon, during the first month of its effectivity, showed very stark results:

- With gross value of the construction industry in Luzon at 54 percent, the impact is about PHP 1.4 trillion Direct Gross Value of Loss to the economy of at least PHP 110 billion for one month
- Using a factor of 53 percent of the Total Workforce of 2.2 million, and with 54 percent of construction workers in Luzon, there were approximately 1.2 million displaced workers

The PCA Board of Trustees, with the Council of Leaders and other industry leaders, saw the imperative to take action – starting with protecting the worksites, and subsequently, for the re-opening of the works – under strict health and safety protocols.

Bayanihan: The Filipino Community Spirit

Joining hands with the government, the association pooled resources with our Member firms, Chapters, and affiliate organizations in the building emergency quarantine facilities for the treatment and monitoring of COVID-19 cases, among others.





Both PCA and PEECC gave a cash donation totaling PHP 1.0 million to Caritas Foundation to help the less fortunate affected by ECQ





The association supported its member firm, the Makati Development Corporation, that worked on the 502-bed facility at the World Trade Center with their parent company





With member firms and those of its affiliate, PSVARE, assisted EEI Corporation to quickly set up 60 emergency medical facilities used by eight hospitals in the cities of San Juan, Mandaluyong, Manila, and Quezon, as well as in Antipolo City in Rizal, Santa Rosa City in Laguna, and Batac City in Ilocos Norte





Those who supported the setting up of emergency facilities included Flowforth Ventures, Deawa Konstruct Inc., Tosot Philippines, Quest-Air Technology Philippines Inc, IEEI Mitsubishi, Will Decena and Associates, FR Sevilla Industrial & Development Corporation, Daikin Philippines, Windtech Energy Conservation, Air Movement Advance System Inc., Thermo Engineering Supply Corporation, and Kalayaan Engineering Co.

Significantly, the association also extended assistance to stranded workers in construction sites in the National Capital Region, even if they are not from member firms.



Initial Impact of the Pandemic to Businesses

In the first half of April 2020, and while under the (initial) recovery stage, the association conducted a Business Resiliency survey – to have a feel of its members' corporate health and resiliency – under a changed environment.

Key findings of the survey are as follows:

- 72.4 percent of the respondents have stopped their operations
- 44.8 percent of the respondents would be needing funds for the rest of the year
- 41.4 percent of the respondents are facing liquidity challenges
- 13.8 percent of the respondents have sufficient funds
- 100 percent of the respondents put the need to collect receivables for financial liquidity
- 51.9 percent of respondents can recover within a period of 6 months, with intervention

PCA's Proposal to Restart Construction

On 9 April 2020, PCA submitted a paper to the House Committee on Public Works and Highways, with suggestions on how to restart construction, and stimulate the economy.

We framed our suggestions into three stages:

- Maintain the industry to remain viable during the quarantine
- Ensure its readiness to restart works and accelerate the progress of projects
- Focus on medium, and long-term plans

That would cut across the following:

- Maintain and accelerate works and removing barriers to it
- Keep the cash inflow in the industry
- Fair and consistent process on how additional cost of contractors is covered or recovered
- Additional support that could be made available for workers and contractors
- Safety and security protocols

Additionally, we also put forward the need for medium to long-term stimulus for the industry to increase its resilience:

- Support construction companies heavily impacted by the work suspension
- Maintain skills and rebuild the workforce

Finally, as we reimagined the "new" or the "next" normal, and for a clarity on the reforms on the regulatory environment, we further proposed:

- The country focus on agro-industrial projects and activities for self sufficiency
- Digitize construction lifecycle, i.e., design, construction, and operation, as well as for permitting, and regulatory purposes

The Country's Fuel for an Economic Bounce Back



In early April 2020, Finance Secretary Carlos G. Dominguez III said that the administration's flagship infrastructure program *Build*, *Build*, *Build* will be a steady force in the Philippines' recovery plan amid the COVID-19 crisis, and will be the fuel to our bounce back.

Presidential-Adviser for Flagship Programs and Projects Secretary Vivencio Dizon, also remarked on how public infrastructure "is the single most-powerful tool governments everywhere can employ in restarting the economy after the devastation wrought by the pandemic."

On 14 April 2020, the association issued a paper entitled, "The Return of the Works". In said paper, we put forward that as construction works are allowed to resume, the industry must be in a good position to restart, while at the same time keeping the workforce safe, and also suggested:

- The PCA COVID-19 Protocols for Construction Sites and Workers Safety and Security
- · Hygienic construction workers' barracks that would have an isolation area
- Antibody testing for returning workers who are coming from different areas
- Compliance to other guidelines issued by the Department of Health

With the following risk factors that need to be addressed and mitigated:

- Contractual issues
- Getting construction workers back

10 Things to Consider Before Returning to Works



As PCA was trying to convince the government to allow construction to resume, perhaps one of the most important advisories and guidelines which the association issued, is the 10 Things to Consider Before the Return of the Works:

- Identify doable projects under the new normal
- Update project execution plans
- Plan the construction sequencing to be followed and upheld
- Identify and screen persoonel
- Draw the site management plan based on the guidelines
- Appoint, enable, and empower Safety Officers
- Design and plan layout of facilities based on the guidelines
- For those with skeletal team on site, to simulate activities and measure productivity
- Communicate with clients, general and sub-contractors, and supply chain
- Share best practices with others

This has been a very useful guide for our members, and other stakeholders in the industry.

Given its vital role in the recovery plan of the government, the stringent safety guidelines for construction was akin to *Protecting the Goose* as said by National Task Force Against COVID-19 spokesperson, Major General Restituto Padilla, in the 2nd edition of the weekly PCA Talks in 2020.

Covid-19 Protocols



As more information on COVID-19 became available, PCA issued the COVID-19 PROTOCOLS FOR CONSTRUCTION SITES WORKERS' SAFETY AND SECURITY, which served as guide for our members and the rest of the industry, in protecting their worksites, workers and community.

The various versions of the protocol served as the precursor to government guidelines for the construction industry, as a condition to allowing the restart of construction works, under Department of Public Works and Highways Department Order No. 39, Series of 2020 – which was issued on 19 May 2020.

77 days after all construction projects have been suspended in the entire Luzon – private and public construction projects were allowed under General Community Quarantine, in accordance with the guidelines issued by the DPWH.

In a sharing session conducted by ASEAN Constructors Federation in 16 August 2021, PCA President Decena shared how PCA was able to respond, recover, restart, reimagine, and reform under these difficult circumstances. He told his peers in the region, "as we continue to face the impact of the coronavirus pandemic, we welcome this sharing session as a way for us to exchange notes on our respective situations, and from this, gain knowledge on how we can better address ours? He adds, "if you have knowledge, let other candles light in it."

Lighting a Candle to Help Others See the Way

With the need to communicate and be a source of information to our membership and the industry, PCA had its first virtual GMM on 7 May 2020. Since then, the Internal and Membership Committee had organized a total of 12 virtual meetings – with an average of 150 virtual participants, which was higher than the average of 130 attendees for on-site meetings in 2018.








This was followed by the PCA Talks, which started out as a weekly event, and became the go-to venue for information for the construction industry, amidst the pandemic and beyond.

Covid-19 Accelerated the Industry's Digital Transformation



The adoption of digital and other modern technologies is one of the key roadmap program clusters, and of its action plans.

As the chief executive officer of one of the largest construction companies in the Philippines shared during one the PCA Talks in 2020, what they have been wanting to do in the last two years, was accomplished during the first two months of the community quarantine.

With the situation, and with job-sites adopting social distancing, productivity and efficiency are expected to be lower. But, as we restarted and adjusted to the new normal, we have suggested that now is the time to harness the benefits of modern and digital technologies.

- The development of the Training Regulation for Building Information Modeling (BIM) that we worked with TESDA – with resources from member firms, ESCA, Makati Development Corporation, Megawide Corporation, and CIM Technologies – was completed in July 2020
- The digitization of the licensing process of the Philippine Construction Accreditation Board – which with guidance and support from the association – was completed in just two months during the quarantine, and was launched during a special PCA Talks on 22 July 2020.

With social distancing restrictions, PCA Foundation's international-assured training programs – Train the Trainers, and the Construction Supervisors Training Program – were able to migrate to digital learning.

PHILCONSTRUCT – the leading construction trade show and biggest expo of its kind in the Philippines, that has defined the landscape of building and construction in the country for three decades – also ventured to a new platform that allowed us to network and build partnerships wherever we are.

PHILCONSTRUCT VX: Beyond Boundaries



Despite the limitations brought about by the times, "we are living up to our promise of serving the industry," as said by PEECC Chairman and President Emilio Tumbocon during the PHILCONSTRUCT VX. He adds, "this platform allows suppliers to promote their new products to the market."

The first of its kind, the trade event offered new opportunites and advantages.

By June 2022, and as the situation continues to improve, we will have hybrid editions of Asia's largest construction event, starting with PHILCONSTRUCT Luzon at the Clark Freeport, followed by Cebu in July, Davao in September, and Manila in November.



Technoforum

Founded in 1995, Technoforum serves as the capacity building platform of PHILCONSTRUCT. But with the constraints on holding face-to-face event since 2020, it also shifted to a digital platform – bringing in subject-matter experts from both the Philippines and abroad.

Banding Together to Lend a Helping Hand

When the successive destructive typhoons Rolly (Goni) and Ulysses (Vanco) hit the Philippines in a span of one week in late October and early November 2020, PCA – through the Disaster Response Committee led by former PCA First Vice President Jerry Pancho, assisted by Noel Flores of PCA Marivalley – mobilized Taskforce Rolly + Ulysses to provide relief and clearing operations in areas hit by the typhoons.







With donations from membership, we provided relief goods for the Victims of Typhoon Rolly in the Bicol region. But as the convoy was heading back to the National Capital Regions, Typhoon Ulysses was starting to make land fall.













Volunteers and resources of Taskforce Rolly + Ulysses – from C.M. Pancho Construction, DDT Konstract, Megawide Construction, EEI, J.E. Manalo Construction, Will Decena and Associates Inc., Monark, PCA Marivalley Chapter (Big Boy Construction, Japcon and Numerit), PCA Metropolitan, Association of Carriers and Equipment Lessors Inc. and Tokwing Construction – immediately conducted the needed clearing operations in Marikina.







The Task Force was also mobilized for the delivery of basic goods, and construction materials such as roofing and plywood, to rebuild damaged houses in the Cagayan Valley region. These were transported to the province with assistance from DDT Konstract and WDA, Inc.

The Task Force also received financial donations from C.W. Home Depot, D.M. EMERGING STRONGER IN 2021


2021 came with high hopes for a better year.

- Sustainable Infrastructure




To become more relevant and stronger, the association saw the need to build up our affiliates and chapters – with whom it continues to engage, enable, and empower.

Productivity Enhancement

With the need for knowledge and skills development to upskill and enhance productivity, the Philippine Constructors Academy was able to train 400 coming from member and chapter firms in 2021 – under a digital platform. We were able to grow and train from just 43 in 2019 to 1,005 in 2021 nationwide.

Pambansang Treyners ng Konstruksyon

Planting the seeds in 2019, PCA now has 128 Pambansang Treyners ng Konstruksyon, nationwide.



A total of 77 graduates at the end of 2019, 110 at the end of 2020, and 128 at the of 2021.

Luzon with 47, Visayas with 37, and Mindanao with 44






The first batch of Pambansang Treyners were trained by our consultants from Peoples1st of the United Kingdom. With 11 from the initial batch qualified as Master Trainers, they have trained the subsequent batches. As of December 2021, we have a total of 128 Master Trainers across our chapters.

Construction Supervisors Training Program

Described as a great equalizer and a game changer in upskilling and producing globally competitive construction supervisors, PCA's international-assured and recognized Construction Supervisors Training Program has empowered an additional 213 graduates nationwide in 2021, bringing the total to 577 graduates since its initial offering in 2019, with ongoing runs with 75 participants as of January 2022.



A total of 577 CSTP graduates since 2019

Luzon with 281, Visayas with 203, and Mindanao with 93

With recognized training partners from member firms, the program is not only offered in that National Capital Region, but also in key cities in Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao – in partnership with our chapters, PCA Pampanga, Cebu Contractors Association, Contractors Association of Negros Oriental, and Davao Constructors Association Center Inc. This 2022, we hope to be able to offer this to other regional sites.



Introduction to FIDIC for Contractors



In empowering Filipino contractors to be globally competitive, the Philippine Constructors Academy offered two batches of the Introduction to FIDIC Contracts in 2021. In partnership with the International Federation of Consulting Engineers, we were able to train a total of 80 from PCA member firms, including those from the chapters.

This well-received and appreciated training was conducted by FIDIC Accredited Trainer, Engineer Salvador P. Castro, Jr.





Masterclass Certificate in Quantity Surveying

As part of the 2021 Masterclass Series, we partnered with the Philippine Institute of Certified Quantity Surveyors, a PCA affiliate member, for the Masterclass Certificate in Quantity Surveying. 40 personnel from PCA Regular and Chapter Member firms nationwide benefited from this masterclass

As PCA Foundation President Anthony L. Fernandez said during the graduation of the first batch in October 2021, "we are happy that we now have 40, but the industry needs more."

The training was conducted for 13 half-days by experts and seasoned QS practitioners coming from the PICQS membership, based in the Philippines and abroad.



Bridging the Skills Gap

Enabling the 10-year industry roadmap's action plan on Government-Industry-Academe Partnership, PCA entered into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with PHINMA Education. This, to equip students with the necessary skills and knowledge, as they complete their education and enter as young professionals – in order to future proof the industry through:

- The appointment of PCA representatives to the PHINMA ED Advisory Council
- Faculty immersion with PCA member companies
- Student immersion or internship with PCA member companies

"This has never been more important than today," as said by PCA Past President Jorge A. Consunji in his message at the signing of the MOA between PCA and PHINMA Education. He added, "together, let us shape our future, and make a difference that matters!"



To bridge the gap between what the academe produces and what the industry needs – not just now, but more importantly in the future – PCA Board of Trustees Albert A. Ignacio and Ferdie M. Mangali, together with Pangasinan Constructors Association Carlito M. Dion, have been appointed to the Advisory Council of PHINMA Education's College of Engineers.

Operationalizing the MOA, and together with the Pangasinan

Constructors Association, the CMDF, and Bentley Education, PCA conducted a special webinar on "Understanding Digital Construction," which was attended by over 1,000 students and young professionals.

In his reaction message, PHINMA Education's University of Pangasinan College of Engineering Dean John Zamora said, "after listening to our speakers this afternoon, I now see the need to introduce the different skills gearing towards Building Information Modeling (BIM) to our students, so that they will be better equipped for the industry."

"Is the industry ready?" asked PCA Past President and CMDF Chairman Augusto F. Manalo in his opening remarks. If not, "we must," he added.

Earlier in the year, PCA partnered with the Contractors Association of Negros Oriental, and Silliman University for a special webinar on "Understanding Construction".



With some 500 students and young professional in attendance, they were exposed to the role of construction in nation-building, what the future holds for the industry, a wholistic perspective on program management – project conceptualization, pre-construction, construction, and post-construction, and the role of ethics and integrity in building a better tomorrow – from seasoned industry practitioners and leaders: Ibarra G. Paulino, Ronaldo R. Elepaño, Jr., Augusto F. Manalo, Alberto A. Ignacio, Rey G. Villar, Wilfredo L. Decena, Norman K. Macapagal, Ramon F. Allado, and Paqui B. Gonzalez.

"This endeavor shows a deep concern for the state and direction of the future of the industry and all those in it," as said by Prof. Jane Belarmino during the Understanding Digital Construction Webinar. She adds, "thank you for including this in the most important topic in the seminar -- ethics and integrity. Our continuing business relationships with contractors are based on trust. Ethical and professional behavior from both parties nurture the relationship. Without this, trust is eroded."

"For the next and new generation, let us continue the journey of nation building," as quoted from Contractors Association of Negros Oriental President Dr. Lita Teves. The association, through President Decena – who sits in the Board of the Antipolo Institute of Technology, a PCA associate member – continues to help guide the institution.

PCA is also working with CMDF for the Students Bridge Skills Olympics in 2022. This competition aims to unlock the creativity and innovation potential of students in the civil engineering and civil technology programs. Moreover, this competition is designed to introduce students to project management techniques, construction methodologies, and digital design platforms.

Policy Advocacy



A long-time advocacy of PCA, and as part of the 10-year industry roadmap, the association supported the legislative measure filed by Representative Romeo Momo Sr., under House Bill No. 10319, or the 30-Year National Infrastructure Program Act of 2021, seeking for a 30-year national infrastructure plan that will cover major infrastructure projects in transport, energy, water resources, information and communications technology, and social infrastructure.

While the House Committee on Public Works and Highways approved the measure, it unfortunately failed to pass the on third and final reading.

As the country legislates a 30-year national infrastructure program, that would serve as a major backbone for our infrastructure plans and a guide for every administration – the association will continue to push for a long-term infrastructure master plan to harmonize the plans, laws, and budgets of the national government and LGUs.

We also supported House Bill No. 7808 and Senate Bill No. 2247, which amended Republic Act No. 4566, otherwise known as the Contractors Law.

Approved by the Conference Committee of both houses of congress, the measure, which increases the penalties for violations – including engaging in construction works without first securing a license from PCAB – also extends the renewal of licenses to every 2 years for those who have been in operation in good standing for at least 10 years, and 3 years for those with 25 years of operations.

1-Million Jobs Project

Together with the Employers Confederation of the Philippines, the Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Philippine Exporters Confederation, Hotel and Restaurant Association of the Philippines, the Philippine Hotel Owners Association, and the Semiconductor and Electronic Industries in the Philippines – PCA is a signatory to the "REFORM. REBOUND. RECOVER: ONE MILLION JOBS FOR 2021" of the National Employment Recovery Strategy (NERS).

In his speech during the signing of the covenant at the 42nd Annual Employers Conference in June 2021, President Decena said, "as we continue to build our bridge to the future, the industry and the government needs to work hand-in-hand in addressing all these challenges, as we also work on the larger goals for the benefit of the country."


As reported in the media last 18 January 2022, DTI Secretary Lopez was quoted "[that both] the public and private sector was estimated to have generated at least 1.5 million jobs in 2021 under the NERS program." He adds, "an estimated 600,000 jobs have been created by the public sector, mostly from the construction industry."

Protecting Our Workers, Worksites and Community



Vaccination is seen as an effective weapon in combatting the spread of COVID-19.

In early 2021, the association consolidated the order for 18,000 doses of Moderna vaccines through the ICTSI Foundation. We also acted for our member firms in engaging AC Health as the Health Service Provider in administering the vaccines to our members employees and family members in the National Capital Region, Cebu, Davao, and other regions in the country.



Under the QC PROTEKTODO

WORKERS, where the association
collaborated with the Quezon
City Local Government and the
St. Luke's Medical Center in
Quezon City, we were able to fully
vaccinate some 2,000 workers of
Quezon City-based PCA member
firms.

Trustee Norman K. Macapagal was instrumental in soliciting the support of St. Luke's Medical Center – whose team of medical workers administered the vaccines provided by the Quezon City Local Government – to help the industry achieve herd immunity.

During the vaccination program, PCA member firms, CM Pancho Corporation, EEI Corporation, DATEM, DMCI, WDA, Inc., Pacific Paint (Boysen) Philippines, PCA Metropolitan Chapter donated food and other resources for our volunteers.

As part of the NERS 1-Million Jobs Program, we formed part of taskforce led by the Department of Labor and Employment, (DOLE) and the Employers Confederation of the Philippines, for the Vaccination Program of Construction and Manufacturing Workers.





Under this program, in addition to 2,000 workers vaccinated in the National Capital Region, we were able to fully vaccinate more than 5,000 workers in Bataan, Bulacan, Pangasinan, Cebu, and Dumaguete.

The efforts of our chapters – PCA Bataan, PCA Bulacan, Pangasinan Constructors Association, Cebu Contractors Association, and the Contractors Association of Negros Oriental – have been lauded by our partners from the DOLE for the successful vaccination drive.













In addition to these, are individual vaccination programs of member firms, affiliates, and chapters. Led by its President Antonio Uy, DCACI and its member firms partnered with the Davao City Local Government in vaccinating some 10,000 workers in the region.

The effort by PCA in vaccinating the construction industry workers was recognized by DOLE during the department's 88th anniversary last 6 December 2020 – the only industry association that was conferred this recognition.








As President Decena said, in his message at the 2nd Virtual Christmas part of the association last 10 December 2021, "the world continues to navigate through the coronavirus pandemic, it is incumbent upon all Nation-Builders to continue PROTECTING OUR WORKSITES, WORKERS, AND COMMUNITIES."

"Imagine a fully vaccinated construction industry – including those from our sectors. This will result to a surge in economic activity," President Decena added.

Tatag at Tapat

Tatag and Tapat or building with integrity is the battle cry of the 10-year industry roadmap. In line with this, PCA's 2021 strategic agenda and thrust is grounded on ethics and integrity.




PCA – through its Ethics and Integrity Committee, chaired by Immediate Past President Agoncillo, and its Technical Working Group (TWG), chaired by Trustees Francicso "Paqui" Gonzalez – updated the association's Code of Ethics to be attuned with the times.

Upon the approval by the Board of Trustees, the updated Code of Ethics was presented to the membership, and to the public during the 14th PCA Talks, "Rethinking Ethics and Integrity", held last 24 June 2021.





At the end of the PCA Talks, President Decena led the membership in making an oath to abide with the Code of Ethics.



Procurement Observers Program

Under Section 13 of the Republic Act No. 9184 otherwise known as the Government Procurement Reform Act, PCA is designated as an observer in Bids and Awards Committee proceedings. To effectively undertake this mandate, and along the PCA Code of Ethics, the Board of Trustees approved the Procurement Observers Program (POP), and designated Trustee Randolf T. Rellera as chairman.




In operationalizing the program, Mr. Rellera consulted with PCA General Counsel Atty. Ellen Francisco, Ethics and Integrity TWG member Engineer Vic Lahoz, and former DPWH Undersecretary Ted Encarnacion if they can help train the PCA POP Volunteers.

35 volunteers coming from PCA chapters, underwent the 2 half-day training last March 2021. And with a clamor for another round of training, the second batch was held last November 2021, with 14 volunteers. As of December 2021, PCA has trained 49 POP volunteers.

For the association to be able to develop a data base upon which it intends to submit our observations and recommendations to the Government Procurement Policy Board (GPPB), a Web Application was developed and deployed for use by the volunteers.

In a virtual meeting in October 2021, GPPB Executive Director Rowena Candice M. Ruiz, expressed her excitement on the POP Program, and this collaboration with the private sector.



Celebrating Philippine Excellence As We Build a Better Tomorrow



PCA partnered with the American Concrete Institute-Philippines Chapter (ACIP) for the Philippine Excellence in Concrete Construction Awards (PECCA), with Trustee Arlan P, Vergara, together with ACIP President Froilan Martillano, as the PECCA co-chairmen.

Launched last 5 December 2020, the awards highlight and celebrate Philippine excellence as we build a better tomorrow, and be global partners in building nations. These are the aspirations of the 10-year industry roadmap the association is enabling.





The winners in the first ever Philippine Excellence in Concrete Construction Awards were the Infinity House by Carlo Calma Consultancy (Low-Rise Building), SM 4 ECOM Center by EEI Corp. (Mid-Rise Building), ATG Towers 2 by the Makati Development Corp. (High-Rise Building), Mactan Cebu International Airport Terminal 2 by Megawide Construction Corp. (Infrastructure), Parañaque Integrated Terminal Exchange also by Megawide (Decorative Concrete), and Wilcon Builders Depot by J Vazco Inc. (Horizontal Construction).

The rehabilitation project of the Parish of the Holy Sacrifice Chapel by DMCI Project Developers, Inc. won in the Repair and Restoration category and was announced as the first-ever overall winner of the Philippine Excellence in Concrete Construction Awards.

The award-winning projects were the official entries of the Philippine at the 2021 American Concrete Institute Excellence in Concrete Construction Awards in the United States, with the Infinity House winning 2nd place second place for the Low-Rise category.



Continuing to be the Most Reliable Knowledge Sharing Platform for the Industry

In 2021, the PCA Talks was held on a bi-monthly basis, with the topics were carefully curated, under the association's 2021 Strategic Agenda of Building the Bridge to the Future.

With key strategic thrusts on Policy Advocacy, and Productivity Enhancement, grounded on core values of Ethics and Integrity as themes – the PCA Talks in 2021 had 6 regular webinars. We also held 2 special webinars on guiding the Next Generation of Nation Builders – in partnership with PCA Chapters, and other partners.

The PCA Talks will continue to be a platform of reliable information, and a venue for the private and public sectors to communicate and collaborate for the construction industry.



In "the Road Ahead", PCA President Decena reminds us, "it is still a long road ahead, but the best of us comes when we work collectively."

As we welcome the next generation of nation-builders, the PCA Talks will continue to be a helping hand in guiding our contractors onwards to a brighter the future.

Next Generation of Nation Builders

Following the May 2021 virtual GMM on the topic of BRIDGING GENERATIONS: As the next Generation of Nation Builders Starts to Assume Leadership Roles, PCA Second Vice President and Internal and Membership Affairs Chair Kit Angeles, who himself is a second-generation Nation-Builder, recommended the formation of the PCA Next Gen.

With a need to engage with the next generation, the group, as described by PCA Next Gen Core Team Members Lesley Villanueva and Kathryn Angeles, is "focused on developing multi-dimensional leaders, who are able to thrive under dynamic circumstances". They add, "the group is driven by the common purpose of becoming better people."



Last November 2021, the PCA Next Gen Core Team held a virtual kick-off. Eventually, this will be followed by more events in the future, and the membership will be open to all future construction leaders.

Assisting Smaller Contractors

Given the strain of COVID-19 on contractors, particularly those in the Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises, PCA entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Philippine Guarantee Corporation (PHILGURANTEE) for the provision of credit guarantee programs – to support the working capital requirements, especially during this pandemic period.



As PCA Trustee and B2B Committee Chair Norman Macapagal said, "while we have been allowed to return to works, we continue to face many challenges – with many contractors not been able to get back on their feet yet, and cash flow issues remaining to be a concern."

On his part, PHILGUARANTEE President Alberto Pascual said, "with this cooperation, we have provided the means for small and medium-sized sub-contractors or contractors to take part in nation-building efforts."

PCA chapters in Marikina, Pangasinan, and Negros Oriental connected with PHILGUARANTEE for a briefing on the programs. Unfortunately, this effort was not fully utilized. However, PCA is still continuing its effort to provide support to the industry by creating linkages with other funding agencies.

A BEACON TO INSPIRE PRESENT AND FUTURE LEADERS OF THE INDUSTRY


In September 2021, PCA mourned the passing of our 35th President, Delfin "Ding" Wenceslao, Jr.


